In a spirit of sincere appreciation we dedicate this our yearbook to Mr. George Macy Wheeler, a superb teacher and true friend.

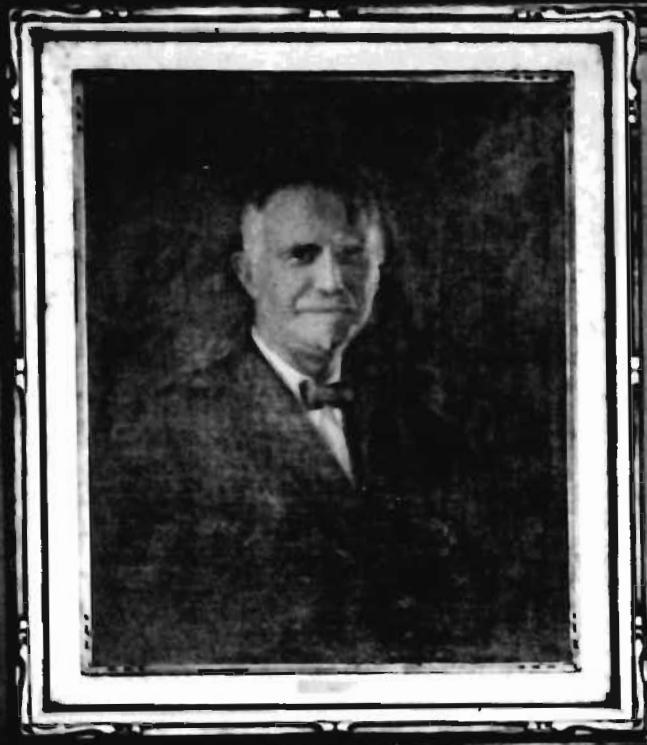

September 3, 1919, marks the founding of Babson Institute. Its purpose was to provide young men with sound business training and so fit them to succeed, whatever the conditions they encountered.

World War II saw hundreds of men trained to serve their country. Today, the spacious campus with its Georgian Colonial buildings, evidences the growth and expansion of the Institute. The thousands of successful graduates attest to the soundness of its program.

The history of Babson Institute is one of service — therein lies its destiny. A new graduate program, new buildings and new courses are part of the plans for the future, designed to serve those who will shape that future.

Founders' Day

The tolling of the Library bell on the morning of November 9, 1951, heralded the start of the fifth annual ceremony in observance of Founders' Day. Sharing the tributes were Mr. and Mrs. Roger Babson, founders of Babson Institute.

President Hinckley opened the program in Knight Auditorium with a brief history of the association between Babson Institute and its founders.

Following President Hinckley on the program were nine speakers representing a few of the business organizations with which Mr. Babson is associated. The theme of each speech was centered upon the relationship between Mr. Babson and the speaker's company, with emphasis on the progress and financial success which resulted.

The list of speakers included: Mr. Charles W. Wallour of Babson Reports, Inc., Mr. John W. Burke of the United Stores Corp., and the Crown Drug Co., Mr. Dwight G. Hollister of the Game-well Co., Mr. Lewis W. Mustard of Tel-Autograph Co., Mr. James G. Hawk of Babson Institute and Mr. Arthur Babson of Consolidated Lobster Co.

A word of greeting was extended to Mr. and Mrs. Babson by Dr. Hinckley on behalf of the Alumni Association, in the absence of its President, Mr. H. L. Colvin. Mr. Rodney C. Penney, President of the Student Council, spoke on behalf of the student body. The program closed with remarks by Mr. and Mrs. Babson and benediction by Dr. Hinckley.



President's Message

Memo to the Class of 1952: Although Commencement is still four months and a half away, I imagine that you have been half-unconsciously reviewing the last three years in your mind, trying to sum up what your life at Babson has included and meant, to you and to the School. By this time you are well convinced, as I have been for a number of years, that education is the most peculiar business in the world, because of the characteristic interplay upon one another of students, faculty, and administration. In a manufacturing plant, for example, the raw material which flows in one end of the factory and emerges from the other end as a finished automobile or refrigerator exercises very little influence of a lasting or permanent nature upon the plant through which it has passed. In a college or other institution of higher learning, such as Babson Institute, the reverse is the characteristic pattern. In a very real sense the college takes on the color of its student body, regardless of how the faculty or administration try to set up procedures, patterns, and traditions. Furthermore, you have yourself unconsciously moulded those traditions and even those members of the faculty and administration with whom you have come in contact. They will never be quite the same as they were before they knew you, just as we hope you will never be quite the same as you were before you knew us! Outwardly, it looks as though we were trying to give you of our wisdom or learning. Actually, we are absorbing from you in almost equal measure — as we seek to contribute to your total education — moods, methods, and beliefs which will be of help or influence us in guiding generations coming after you. This two-way flow of wisdom and counsel, pain and joy, is of course one of the precious qualities of our educational system which are lost in a college whose enrollment is so large as to preclude personal touch and human contact. That is one of the reasons I have dedicated my life to the small college and shall continue to do so.

When you first came on the campus, the Millea Swimming Pool had just been officially opened, the Dougherty Gateway was only an ideal in Miss Dougherty's mind, and Park Manor North was not even in the blueprint stage. I well remember your first year in school and the hard-fought election which centered around the "castle on the hill." I was particularly interested in your Class because it seemed to me the first postwar class which was in a sense composed of civilian college material. Preceding classes had been composed largely of veterans, but I figured that your Class would be the first class to be primarily civilians, and so might be considered a standard yardstick for the shape of things to come.

In your Sophomore year we took a great step forward and applied for accreditation by the New England Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. I remember very well the night of December 1st, after the decision had been announced in our favor, I attended your Class dance, run so admirably at the Hotel Shelton by Jim

Crane. I wanted to broadcast then the news that we had been accepted into full institutional membership by the New England Association, but I didn't because I had promised myself that Mr. Babson should be the first to know. Some of you will remember that I looked unusually happy that night (I suppose because unusual happiness is not a characteristic of college presidents). At any rate, on the next day, December 2d, I told Mr. Babson and announced it to the Trustees and the campus at large by ringing the bell in the tower of the Library. In the fall of 1950 Park Manor North was begun and the Dougherty Gateway completed. Through the facilities of the Babson Institute Press two of our faculty have published books.

Now, in your last year, Park Manor North is completed, the bell in the Library tower strikes ship's time, and we have added a Graduate Center to our campus and an M.B.A. to our educational program. The Board of Business Research has been actively engaged in solving problems for foreign countries under the ECA. The projectors for the Map have been fitted with the first set of slides portraying the oil and gas production and consumption in the United States, and new slides portraying the agricultural development of the United States and the chief roads and points of interest are under construction. Altogether we have a great deal to be proud of in the development of our plant and equipment which you have watched and contributed to during your three years at Babson.

But more important in my eyes than any amount of physical plant expansion is the intangible, unseen, but nevertheless entirely real, and highly gratifying, expansion of student responsibility through a growing awareness of the importance of the Student Council and a growing assumption on the part of the students of a mature attitude toward their own obligations. Through many channels, ideas, concepts, and procedures for more mature student participation in administrative activities have been achieved culminating in representation of the students on the Administrative Council and the initiation of the first step in an Honor System. These two advances, which I think can properly be credited to the Class of '52, have resulted in better student, faculty, and administration relations and cooperation than we have ever enjoyed before. I feel most hopeful that this is but the opening of a new period of intellectual and spiritual expansion comparable to our recent building program and like it destined to make Babson Institute one of the most highly respected and forward looking of all colleges in the east.

In conclusion, let me say that it has been a pleasure to work with you and for you, and that I hope our association may continue to be as happy and as rewarding for many, many years to come. Good-bye and God bless you.

Graduate Program

Babson Institute offers a Graduate Program leading to the degree of Master of Business Administration. Students holding a baccalaureate degree in Business Administration from a recognized college or university can normally expect to complete the requirements for an M.B.A. degree in one year. The holder of a baccalaureate degree in fields other than Business Administration may earn a Master of Business Administration degree in two years.

The first year of the graduate program is devoted to a study of the background subjects which underlie and motivate the control and organization of all business activities. Emphasis is placed on the breadth and thoroughness of training in those fundamentals.

During the second year of the program the students continue with their study of basic fundamentals; in addition, a large proportion of their work is directed toward some specialized field of Business Administration. The field seminar work may be chosen from one of the following areas: Finance, Investments, Industrial Management, Distribution, Labor Relations, Banking, Foreign Trade, or Accounting.

Those students already holding a degree in Busi-

ness Administration, the second year will meet the requirements for the M.B.A. degree.

In addition to the graduate work outlined above, the Institute offers a one-year program leading to a certificate. This program has long been an important part of the Babson Institute Curriculum. It is offered to those who desire an intense and practical course which will give them, in the shortest possible time, the essential background for responsible positions in the business world. This Certificate program covers a period of approximately 35 weeks and it is essentially like the first year of the Master's degree program. In the third term the student may substitute or elect other courses offered by the college except in the field of Accounting.

Admission requirements for the Certificate Courses are essentially the same as for the Master's Degree Program.

A new campus was acquired this year for the Graduate Center and plans are being formulated for utilizing it in the future. The next few years will see great strides in the progress of the Graduate School. Babson Institute has grown and prospered in the service of our future businessmen; its future is predicated upon even greater service.

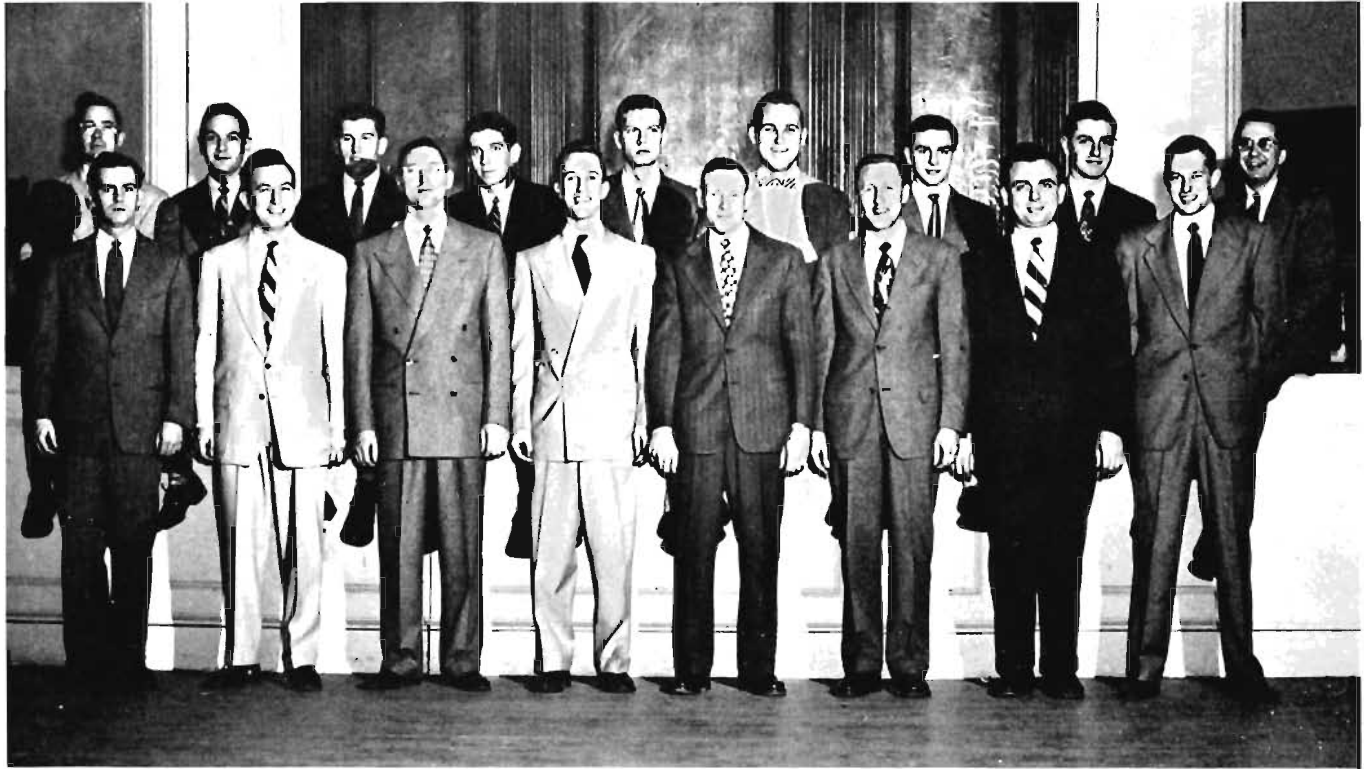
The Student Council is the main organ of student organization and is its chief governing body. It is composed of four officers, elected yearly by the student body, and one elected representative from each class section. The two editors of the student publications, the *Beaver* and the *BABSONIAN*, together with the chairman of the Athletic Council serve as associate members. In addition to its governing and policy-making functions, the Student Council, through subsidiaries, publishes the school paper, the *Beaver*, and its yearbook, the *BABSONIAN*. Throughout the year the Council sponsors many worthwhile activities. These include dances and other social functions, charity drives, lectures and student rallies. It is the purpose of the Council to make known to the administration the needs and desires of the students and in turn impart to the student body the policies of the school.

Upon taking office in the early fall, the Student Council immediately undertook to build upon the foundation laid by preceding Councils. Their goal is to develop an organizational structure that will be worthy of complete responsibility for student administration. One step taken which resulted in a new source of responsibility and a vastly improved channel of communication came about through an offer to the Executive Committee of the Student Council by the College Administration, inviting them to become a part of the Administrative Council of the school. It is felt that this step will make

possible a much closer affiliation between the Council and the Administration and thereby result in greater understanding and cooperation between them. As a result of this marked achievement a new vitality and interest has been manifested by the Student Council representatives and by the student body as a whole.

Encouraged by this sign of confidence, the Student Council immediately took steps toward further progress in the area of increased responsibility by laying the foundation for student disciplinary action concerning conduct in examinations. A trial honor system was established for those who wished to take examinations without faculty proctors. A special room was set aside and examinations conducted under a strict code of honor requiring each man to give immediate notice of any irregularities in conduct observed by him during the examination. The Council then appointed a three-man committee to make a thorough study of honor systems as conducted in the leading colleges and to report their findings to the Council. Initial efforts were directed toward establishing an honor code for the examinations. The Student Council later voted to accept the honor system proposal submitted by the Slye committee and to have it presented to the student body for final approval. Under this system all examinations are to be unproctored and all students will sign a pledge at the end of each exam stating that he has neither given nor received

any aid. Any student accused of a violation will be tried by a student court and if deemed guilty a recommendation for his expulsion will be forwarded to the Administrative Council for final action. Adoption of this system by the student body will make possible to at last establish a long-sought-after goal.

The Social Committee of the Student Council, under the direction of its chairman, Ernest Raasch, played an important part in developing school spirit through social activities. Foremost among these activities was the traditional and colorful Winter Carnival weekend. Memorable Spring weekend brought to a successful conclusion the year's social schedule.

Two outstanding features of the year, exemplifying the spirit and cooperation of the entire student body and members of the faculty as well, were the Blood Donor Drive and the Charities Bazaar. The Blood Drive committee under the direction of the Student Council was composed of Walt Leahy, Bill Frazier, Doug Haywood and Earl Carpenter. As a result of the hard work of this committee plus the whole-hearted support of the student body and members of the faculty, the Blood Donor Drive was an outstanding success.

The Charities Bazaar, a tradition at Babson Institute, was an overwhelming success this year.

Bill Maunder and the charities committee, supported by the Cabinet, succeeded in drawing a capacity crowd of students, guests and faculty members to the Bazaar. The hospital located near the school is among the charities benefiting from the proceeds of the Bazaar.

Establishing a new precedent this year, the License Committee set fees for all licenses issued to students desiring to conduct business activities on the campus. This income helped to improve the cash position of an unusually tight budget.

This year's Student Council has succeeded in establishing firm ground upon which succeeding Councils can build. With responsibility as a byword, the Councils of tomorrow will progress and achieve outstanding success in the service of the student body. The members of this year's Council may be justly proud of their record of achievements and it behooves those who follow in their footsteps to use unusual care and discretion in their every action in order that the newly acquired responsibilities shall not be breached. The best way to attain the goal of full responsibility is to proceed slowly and carefully, maintaining the complete cooperation and support of the entire student body in everything it undertakes.

Though still in its infancy, the Babson Chapter of Blue Key has already taken giant steps since its founding on March 15, 1951.

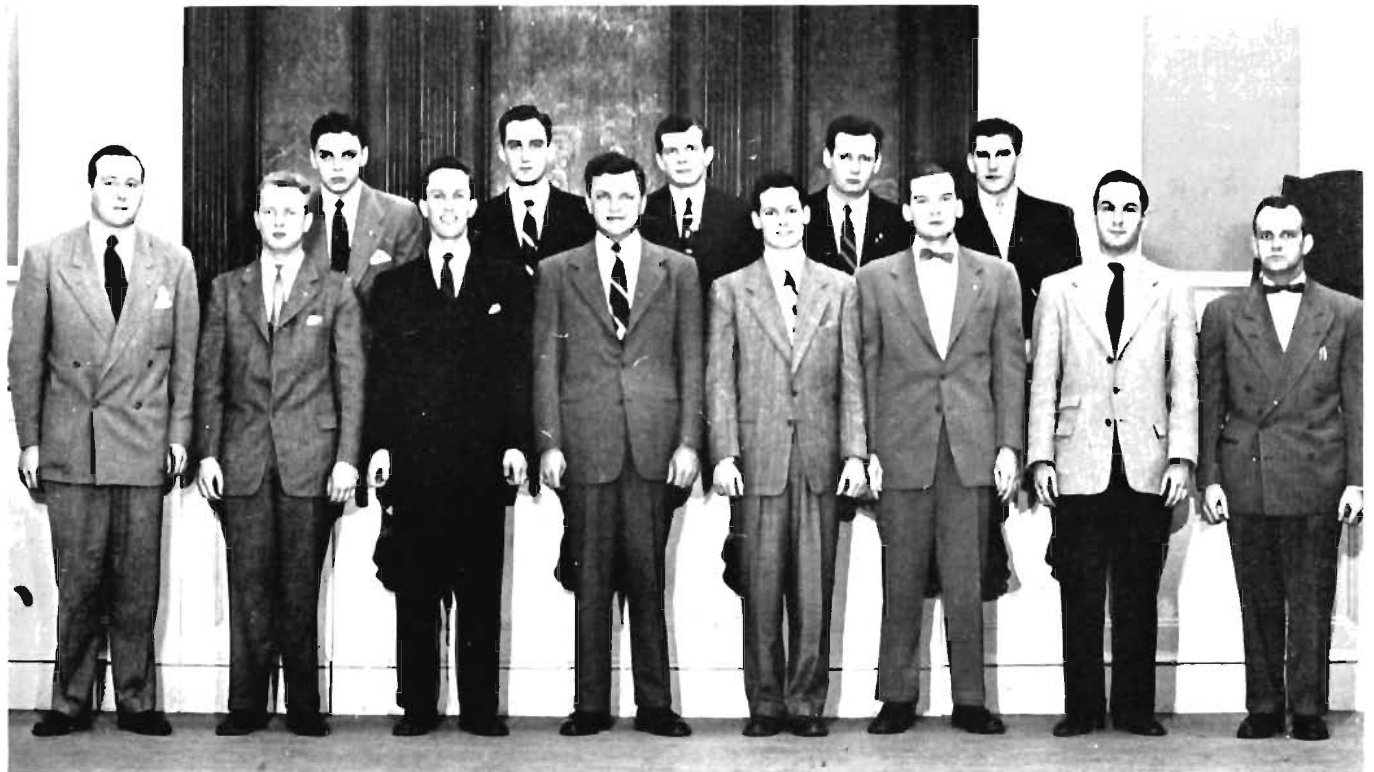
The group upon request of the Student Council took the first positive step in the Fall term toward

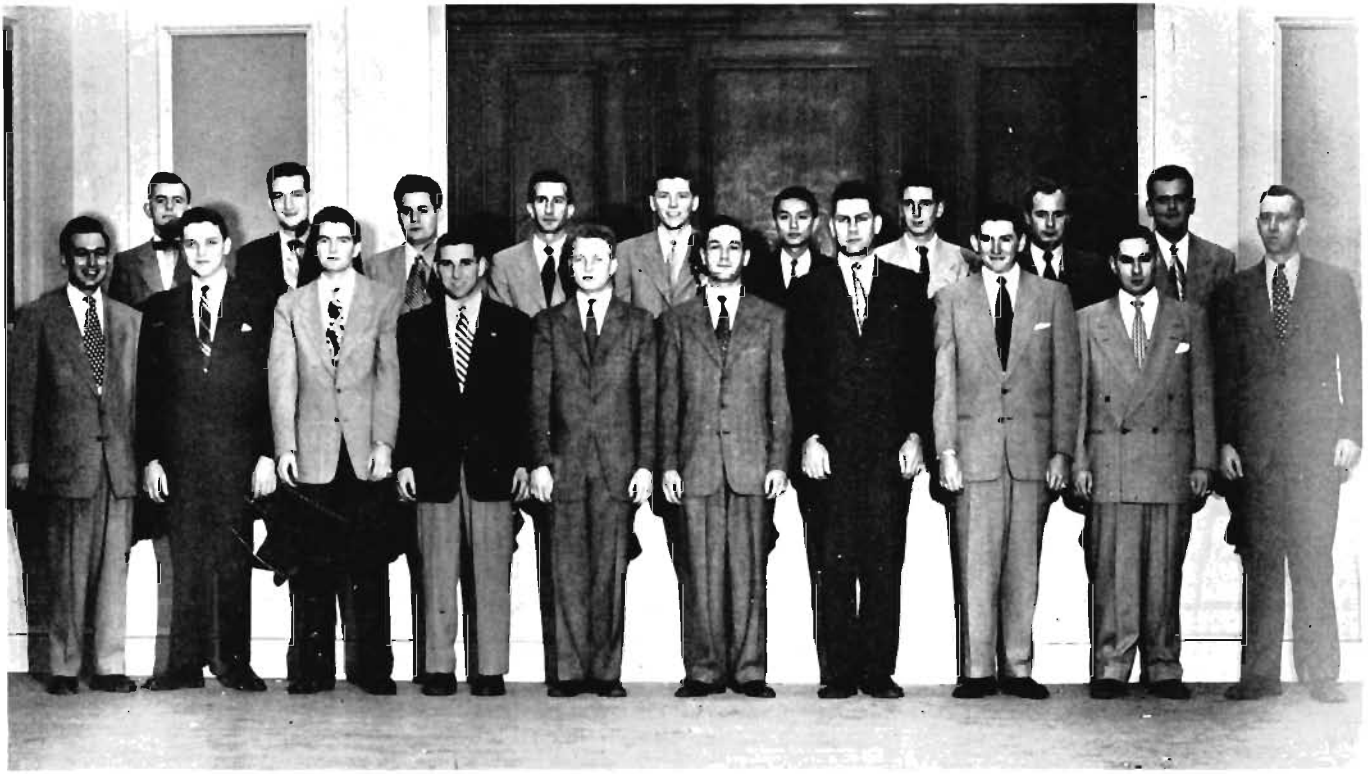

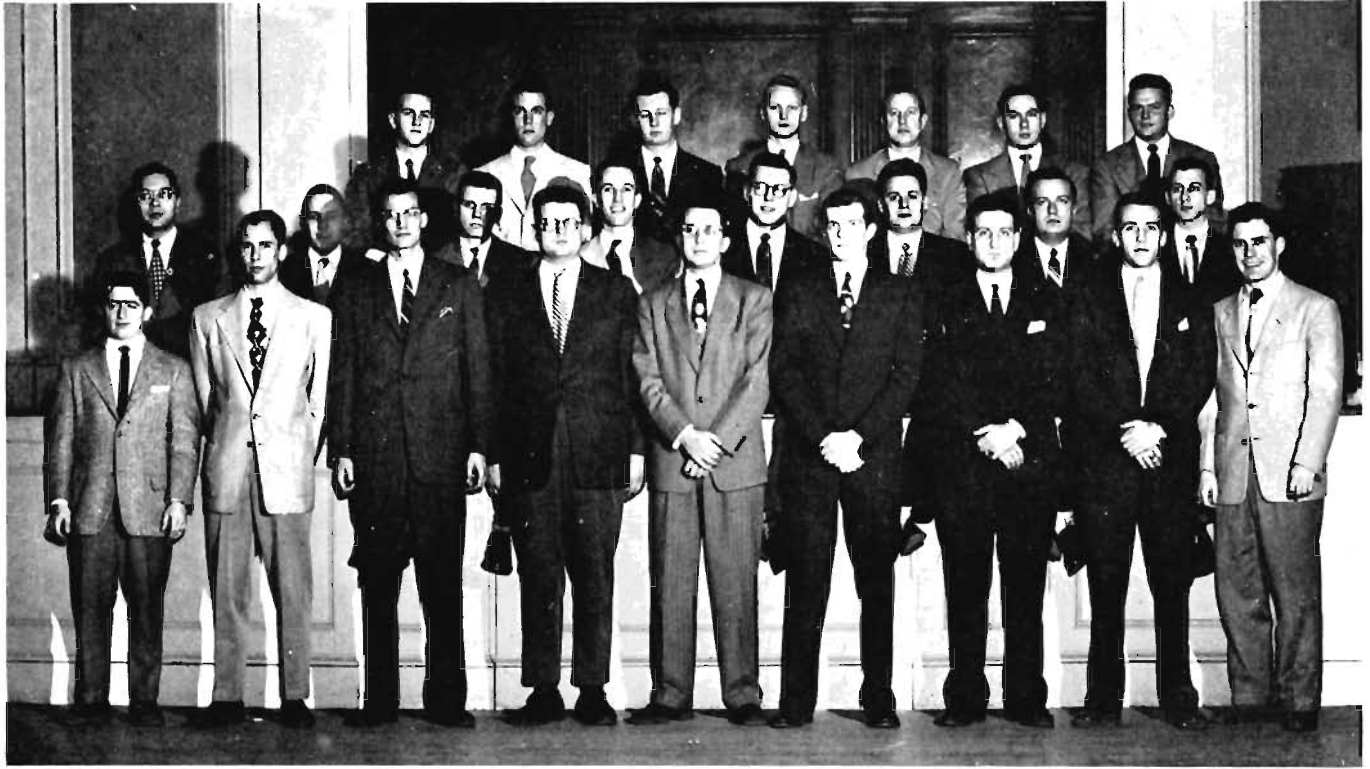

Beaver

In its sixth year on the Babson campus the *Beaver* was, as usual, alternately booming with activity and busting away from the printers with a sigh of relief as each issue went to bed.

With a marked decline in enrollment resulting in curtailed budgets for all student activities, the *Beaver's* first and most persistent headache proved to be financial.

Considering several alternatives — including bi-weekly publication and a mimeographed sheet — the *Beaver* finally decided to boost its size about 30%, double its advertising goal, and sink or swim on the achievement of this program.

It was the outstanding efforts of Ed Applequist, Harry Jeffries and Advertising Manager Bill Holabird which kept the *Beaver* swimming — even though it was unsteady at times.

In step with the times, the 1951-1952 *Beaver* was one of the first college papers in the country to bring more pictures to its readers, at less cost, with the newly developed Fairchild engraver.

But the crowning achievement of the year — in

the eyes of both the staff and the student body was the Winter Carnival parody issue, with a headline reading "New Dormitory Collapses." Directed by Ben Bidwell, this issue poked fun at just about everyone (often with the help of Art Wendel's photo-magic), and by the end of the year copies were as scarce as hen's teeth.

Editorially, by far the biggest issue of the year was the cheating question. It took a bit of head-scratching and more than a little night work, but the *Beaver* felt it had passed some sort of landmark when it brought the issue out in the open in a page-one editorial.

Operating on a share-the-work basis, Editor Dick Belew found able support in Associate Editors Carl Adler, Harry Jeffries, Dan Levant, Fred Pease, Bill Reineman, Penn Westman and a large staff extremely liberal with their time and effort.

By constantly emphasizing the need to pass the torch the *Beaver* entered the third term with a sizable element of underclassmen in responsible positions, ready to take over in 1952-1953.

Alpha Delta Sigma

Alpha Delta Sigma at Babson reached the peak of its career as first and oldest fraternity on campus by playing host to the National Convention on Cape Cod last summer. Leaders from the Advertising Industry were present to address and mingle with delegates from A.D.S. Chapters all over the nation. Unanimously termed the "best Convention ever," its success reflected credit on both the George W. Coleman Chapter and the Institute.

During the school year, the fraternity enjoyed a series of interesting meetings at which several outstanding personalities from the field of distribution were featured as guest speakers. Delta Sigma Pi

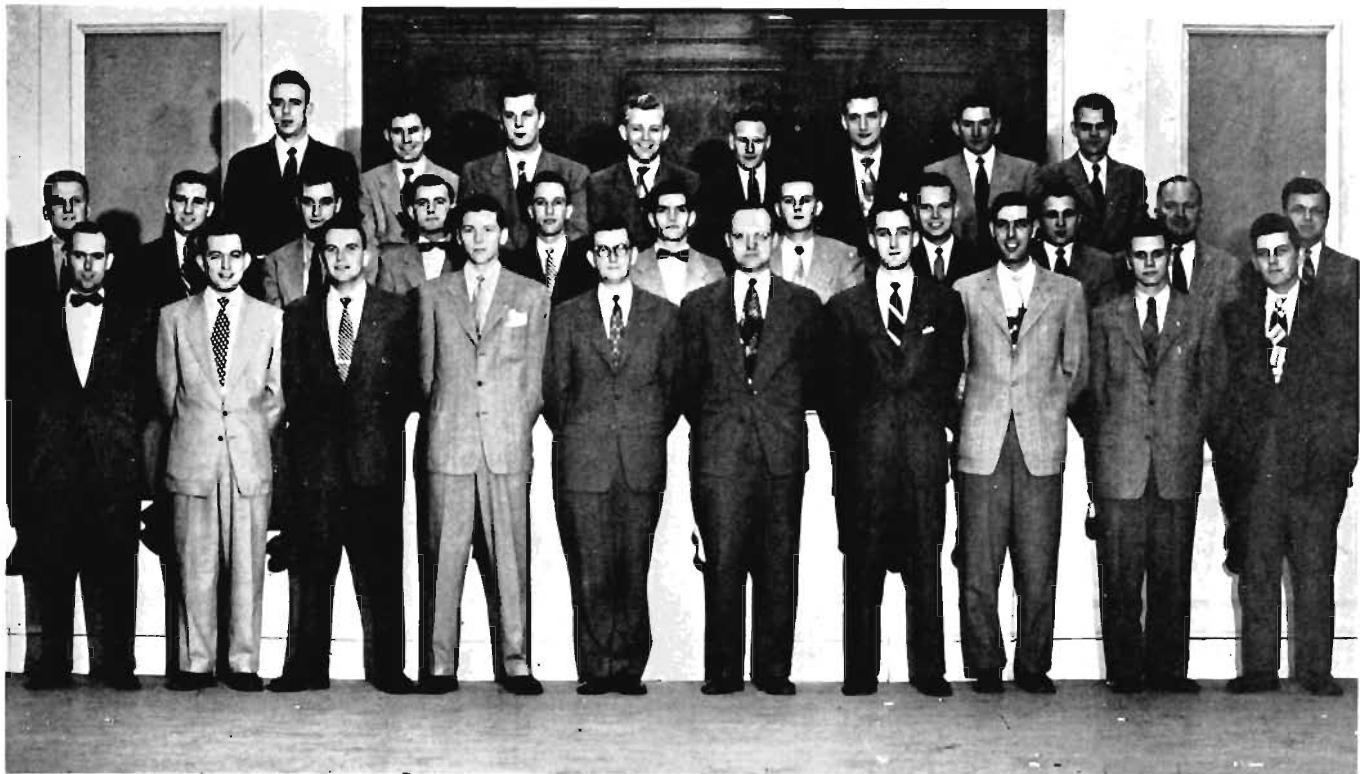

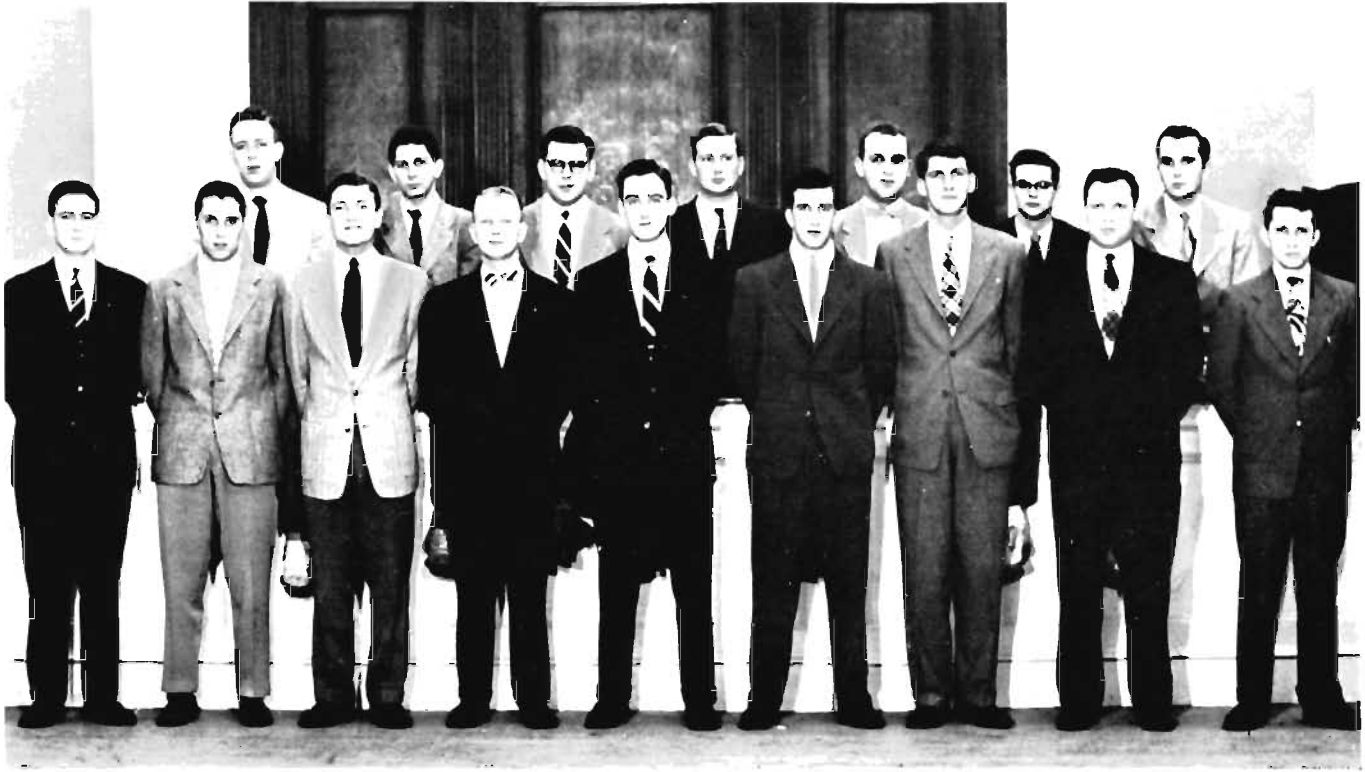

Airport operations are at Westboro Airport. At this easily accessible airport the Club members

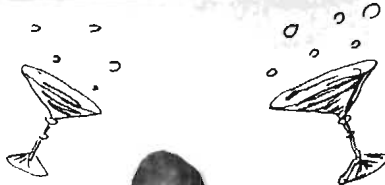
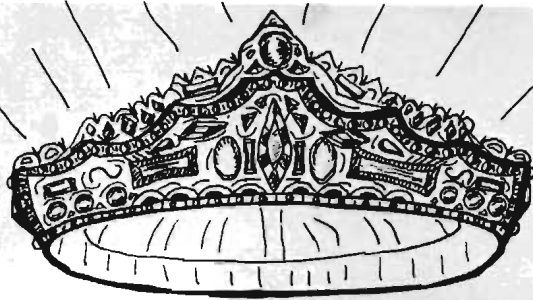
